## Transformation Scores

Every family in care of Brigid's Path completes a series of surveys to help us better understand their experience, what we can improve, and their perspective on the transformation happening in their life.

In Q4 2024, our family transformation score was 92%

In Q4 2024, we had a mom at Brigid's Path who was doing a great job in caring for her baby. However, given her past circumstances, Children's Services felt it was important for her to have more time before being able to take the baby home.

During this period, we connected her with a local sober living program. She worked diligently on her recovery and made significant progress, proving to Children's Services that she was fully capable of providing a stable and loving environment for her child. As a result, custody of baby was successfully returned to mom, and both are thriving.
