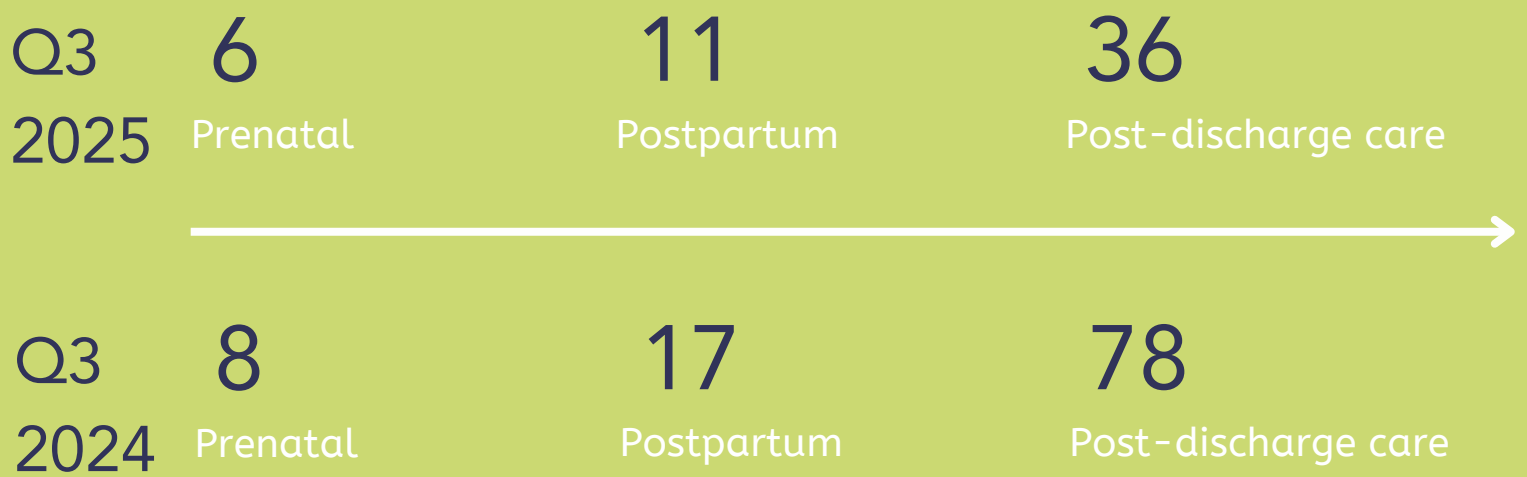


Q3 Program 2025 PROGRESS

Family Program Flow

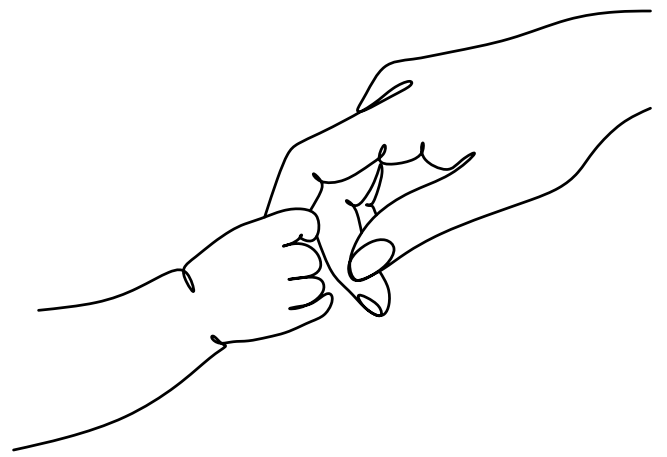

By setting clear expectations and providing consistent support, families are more motivated to engage in treatment and take steps toward reunification. Stories of Transformation

We had our 300th baby come in July. This was a past parent that was in a completely different place from when she came to us the first time. A couple of years ago when she first came to our program, she was still actively using. Her family advocate took her to treatment have continued working with her as a support the last couple of years so that when she had her baby in July, she had been sober for two years. Her baby came to us for withdrawal management only due to mom being on Suboxone. She has been doing so phenomenally that children's services did not even open a case they only had to be in our program for 10 days.
